

## Claytee D. White

Claytee D. White is the inaugural director of the Oral History Research Center at UNLV Libraries. In this position, she collects the history of Las Vegas and the surrounding area by gathering memories of events and experiences from long-time residents. Projects include Latinx Voices, Asian American Pacific Islanders, and the ongoing project of the African American Experience in Las Vegas. Claytee has written several book chapters, journal articles, and presented oral history papers at national conferences from Atlanta to Maui.

She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in social work from California State University Los Angeles, a Master of Arts degree in history from the University of Nevada Las Vegas, and engaged in additional graduate work at the College of William and Mary. In 2025 she became a Distinguish Nevadan and was granted an honorary Doctorate Degree in Humane Letters.

A native of Ahoskie, North Carolina, Claytee is a member of the national Oral History Association, past president of the Southwest Oral History Association, former Chair of the Las Vegas Historic Preservation Commission, and serves on Boards for <a href="BlackPast.Org">BlackPast.Org</a>, The Mob Museum, Women of Diversity, and the Obodo Collective.
