So Lauren, do you mind leading us in roll call? And 9 we will say we are officially bringing this meeting to order at 1:01. MS. DIPENTINO: You got it. Yes, sir. 10 All right. Chair Rogers. 11 CHAIR ROGERS: Present. 12 13 MS. DIPENTINO: Trustee Turner-Whiteley. TRUSTEE TURNER WHITELEY: Present. 14 MS. DIPENTINO: And for the record, I see Trustee 15 Dutkowski. 16 TRUSTEE DUTKOWSKI: Yes, I'm present. Thank you. 17 MS. sorry, I don't have -- let me move screens. So the agenda, we have 1 2 roll call. Do we have anyone signed up for public comment? 3 MS. DIPENTINO: No, sir, not at this time. CHAIR ROGERS: All right. No one signed up for public 4 5 comment. 6 Do we have Committee action to accept the proposed 7 agenda? Do we have a motion? 8 TRUSTEE TURNER WHITELEY: So moved. CHAIR ROGERS: Do we have a second? 9 TRUSTEE DUTKOWSKI: I'll second. 10 CHAIR ROGERS: All those in favor, say aye. 11 [ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT] 12 13 CHAIR ROGERS: All right. Motion carries. We will transition to Agenda Item No. IV, New Business. 14 Floresto, I'll turn it over to you. 15 MR. CABIAS: All right. Thank you, Chair. I'll go ahead 16 17 and share the presentation here. And good afternoon, everyone. For the record, I'm 18 Floresto Cabias, the District's Chief Financial Officer. And today I'll 19 give you an update on where the District stands financially as of 20 21 June 30th, 2025. These numbers are still unaudited, but they give a clear picture of how we finished the year and what's ahead. 22 23 And as I'll point out, a few things have been updated since we originally prepared this information for the Committee, mainly 24 25 because the state of Nevada recently gave us more complete data

and we made some normal year-end accounting adjustments.

CHAIR ROGERS: So Floresto, is that -- are those updates not reflected in the attachment that was part of Diligent?

MR. CABIAS: Yes, that's correct. So I'm presenting here the same attachment you all may have reviewed, and I added in some new information to show you the changes between the original presentation and the numbers that we updated.

CHAIR ROGERS: Thank you.

MR. CABIAS: You're welcome.

I wanted to start with some good news. On July 29th, we closed both the Federal New Markets Tax Credit Program and the Nevada New Markets Jobs Act Program transactions. Together, those deals brought in \$4 million for the new West Las Vegas library. Some of you might remember hearing an earlier number closer to \$5 million. The difference is the cost of closing the transaction. That includes attorney fees, consultants, and other deal costs that come with putting this type of financing together.

We also had to adjust the structure toward the end because the two investor banks had different rules and that meant fewer community development entities were able to participate, which lowered the amount of potential funding. But we still got a very strong result. When you add this \$4 million to the \$6.5 million we received from the first round in 2024, that's almost \$11 million total for West Las Vegas.

And I want to thank all the Trustees here and all the

Trustees on the full Board, along with Directors on both the QALICB Board and the Foundation Board, because it was a bit of a scramble at the end. We convened those special board meetings and fortunately everyone was able to attend to approve the special resolutions to help close this deal.

And beyond helping fund construction, the benefit is that it frees up our own capital reserves so we can use those dollars for other library needs, especially new capital initiatives. We'll keep looking for more opportunities with these programs for future projects too.

CHAIR ROGERS: Nicely done.

MR. CABIAS: Thank you.

As far as the consolidated sales tax, when we first prepared this consolidated sales tax slide, it looked like the Fiscal Year 2025 CTX revenues were \$29.4 million. I'm sorry, I was at the revised schedule. Here's the original information that was presented in your attachments. The \$29.4 million was down \$1.8 million from the prior year, about a 5.7 percent drop, and about 7 percent under budget.

Since then, we got updated numbers from the Department of Taxation, and the picture is actually better than we thought. The final total for Fiscal Year 2025 was actually about \$31 million, basically flat with Fiscal Year 2024 and only about 2 percent under budget. Now, this change has a lot to do with the state's reporting issues. They've been modernizing their systems, and the staff has

been reporting this in the monthly financial services board reports.

And that's caused delays and differences in how the data is reported.

On top of that, they've been dealing with network problems tied to a cyber attack on the state system in late August. I've mentioned before that comparing CTX month-to-month against the prior year has been tricky, and this is exactly why. The state is still working through those reporting challenges.

So the decline wasn't as steep as it first looked, but the overall story is still the same. The years of post-pandemic rebound are behind us, and now we're in a period of normalization and slower growth.

CHAIR ROGERS: May I -- I just want to acknowledge that Trustee Sanchez has joined.

MS. DIPENTINO: Thank you, Chair.

CHAIR ROGERS: And did Trustee Foyt, was she able to successfully join?

MS. DIPENTINO: We don't see her yet.

CHAIR ROGERS: Okay. As you were, Floresto. Sorry for the interruption.

MR. CABIAS: Oh, no problem. Thank you, Chair.

In this slide, we wanted to show the ten-year trend to kind of explain further the differences in CTX over time, especially when we believed that the CTX for 2025 was coming in lower. So this illustrates that. And as you can see, the drop that came from the

 \$29.4 million estimate is here for Fiscal Year 2025.

And here's the updated version. Fiscal Year 2025 actually matched Fiscal Year 2024 at about \$31 million. The big picture hasn't changed, though. We had steady growth before COVID, then the sharp decline in 2020, then the strong rebound in 2022 through 2024, thanks to stimulus and pent-up spending. And now we're flattening out.

That's why we budget conservatively, especially under Executive Director Watson's leadership, which helped us navigate through the pandemic. We don't plan as if the peak years will keep repeating. We plan for things to level out and then it keeps us prepared if the economic slows -- the economy slows even more.

On the property tax side, things are very strong compared to actual Fiscal Year 2024. Fiscal Year 2025 revenues were up \$5.1 million or 8 percent. Actual collections in Fiscal Year 2025 were \$68.9 million, basically right on target with the \$68.6 million budget. Fiscal Year 2026, for that year, we're budgeting \$76.2 million, which is about an 11 percent increase. And that shows continued growth in the local property tax base, and it helps us balance out the volatility we sometimes see with the sales tax.

General Fund Expenditures for Fiscal Year 2025. When we first prepared this information, we reported total Fiscal Year 2025 expenditures at \$82.8 million, which looked about 14 percent under budget. Salaries and benefits were estimated at \$52.5 million, about \$8.2 million under budget. After closing the books, though,

we added an additional \$1.5 million payroll accrual, which is a normal year-end adjustment. It accounts for payroll earned in June, but not paid until July. With that adjustment, Fiscal Year 2025 expenditures are now \$84.3 million, still well under budget, but the savings aren't quite as large as we first thought.

Salaries and benefits now total \$54 million, about \$6.8 million under budget. So the overall picture hasn't changed.

Spending was still lower than budgeted across the board, but the margin of savings is a little smaller after the adjustment.

And just to connect us back to past discussions, this is why we budget personnel as if every position is filled all year, even though we know that turnover will create some savings. And that approach has kept us flexible. We can hold off filling vacancies or restructuring positions when needed, and that helps us manage costs in real time.

It's also important because like we've talked about before, service contracts are getting more expensive in today's economy. With inflation and higher wages, it means we're seeing bigger numbers when contracts come up for renewal. So our budgeting approach makes sure that we can absorb those increases without cutting back on services.

All right. That takes us to fund balances in the General Fund. The Fiscal Year 2025 budgeted projected ending General Fund balance is \$14.5 million. That's 15 percent of expenditures, and that's our rule of thumb for a safe margin. The actual Fiscal

Year 2025 ending fund balance came in at about \$31.2 million, which is 38 percent of expenditures. Both figures are transferring \$16.5 million to the Capital Projects Fund. So those are the fund balances after we've transferred almost \$17 million from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund.

For Fiscal Year 2026, the budget includes an \$18 million transfer. And as always, these reserves are by design; they're the safety net that lets us handle unexpected changes, whether it's swings in sales tax, shifts in federal funding, or higher operating costs for things like facility contracts. And we've seen all of those things over the last fiscal year, which is exactly why we've emphasized in past meetings our conservative budgeting and how it ensures we maintain stability in keeping services running and keeping projects moving forward.

We are also continuing to make adjustments to these numbers, but I've highlighted the most significant changes. The financial statement auditors will start field work next week, and we'll be asking the Finance and Audit Committee to meet again in November to review the results of the audit.

That's the financial update. Mr. Chair, thank you. I'd be glad to answer any questions.

CHAIR ROGERS: All right, I'll open it up to my fellow

Trustees to see if there are any questions. Thorough presentation,
as always.

TRUSTEE TURNER WHITELEY: I have one quick question.

Floresto, the General Fund balance is so much higher; that's a reflection of the savings and also of the increased taxes, correct?

MR. CABIAS: Yes, that's correct.

TRUSTEE TURNER WHITELEY: Perfect. Thank you.

MR. CABIAS: And Vice Chair Whiteley, I just want to add on to that, is expected. We budget for a 15 percent fund balance, but I mentioned how we expect a higher savings and that's what contributes to the large transfers from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund every year.

TRUSTEE TURNER WHITELEY: I remember you telling us about that last time. I just wanted to make it really clear for the record. Thank you for your conservative approach.

MR. CABIAS: You're welcome.

CHAIR ROGERS: Trustee Dutkowski or Trustee Sanchez, you have any questions?

TRUSTEE SANCHEZ: I don't have any questions, just a comment saying that this is very thorough and thank you for providing this information. I guess maybe I have one question, which is, Floresto, what are you seeing -- or what are they saying for the future? I understand you don't have a crystal ball, but since we are starting this normalization process, what do you project for our future provided -- knowing that you have no crystal ball, I understand that.

MR. CABIAS: Yes, thank you, Trustee Sanchez. Yeah, I know we've talked about this in the past. What's optimistic, you

know, as far as you know, from our point of view, is that the sales tax revenues did not come in as low as it looked. The trend was concerning for a little while there, but fortunately it was just due to reporting challenges from the state of Nevada. So we would be more concerned had the number really come in at \$2 million under, at \$29 million. But the fact that we remain flat over the last couple years suggests that the Las Vegas economy is actually more resilient than it appears.

And across the country, I know that, you know, my peers are all cautiously optimistic, but at the same time, we're preparing our budgets, you know, in a similar fashion, knowing that this potential recession that the economists are looking at could be more severe, but it's too early to tell. You know, we continue to hold the line, move forward with our conservative budgeting approach to insulate the District from any severe downturns.

But as of right now, it doesn't -- I hate to be too optimistic about this, but again, I have these discussions with the Executive Director and the Administrative Team, and we're comfortable moving forward with all of the initiatives from capital projects to programming, you know, based on our current budget, our ending fund balance, and not seeing a whole lot of the sky falling at this point.

TRUSTEE SANCHEZ: Thank you. Appreciate your comments.

MR. CABIAS: Thank you.

TRUSTEE DUTKOWSKI: I just have a comment. This is

Trustee --

CHAIR ROGERS: Yeah. Go ahead, Trustee Dutkowski.

TRUSTEE DUTKOWSKI: Yes, I just want to say that I really appreciate the work all of this goes -- you guys all do putting this together. It's a very comprehensive, yet easy to understand report.

And thank you to the -- appreciate the good work you're doing.

MR. CABIAS: Thank you, Treasurer Dutkowski.

CHAIR ROGERS: Trustee Sanchez pre-empted me on the question I was going to ask about sort of as we forecast for the future, what adjustments might we want to take into consideration. And certainly I agree with my other trustee colleagues, just, you know, the reports are always thorough and it's certainly great to be in a -- closing the year in a strong financial position where other entities aren't in as strong a position as we are.

And so Floresto, I certainly appreciate your leadership and Kelvin's and all the other team members who contribute to helping us run, you know, a lean shop and really follow our budgets and really manage those staff vacancies. That's a strategy that we employ typically here at the university, knowing that, you know, we're going to budget for 100 percent, but we know we're going to have some attrition throughout the year and being able to delay or push filling those positions to help get your budget into the ratio that you prefer to be in.

So certainly I appreciate the hard work and this -- and I

don't have any questions but just, you know, accolades for the whole team doing the work.

MR. CABIAS: All right. Thank you, Chair.

CHAIR ROGERS: And let me see if I can get back to the agenda. And that was for discussion only. And so Floresto, I'm believing that you would do a similar presentation at Thursday's meeting?

MR. CABIAS: I can. It's not in the agenda, but I can provide --

CHAIR ROGERS: Well, no, no. If it's not on the agenda, then we won't add. I just presume that it might be. But maybe that's something I can comment on during the Chair's Report, just sort of where we are financially, and just maybe have you come up and just reinforce sort of the -- a brief summary of how strong we closed out FY25. And we came in stronger in some areas that we had initially thought we weren't.

MR. CABIAS: Okay. And I don't believe Executive
Director Watson will be available to attend the meeting on
Thursday in person, so I can also speak to it under the Executive
Director's report.

CHAIR ROGERS: Perfect. I know he said he wasn't sure, and I'm glad to hear that he is taking the advice to let us run the meeting in his absence. Okay, that sounds good.

And do we have anyone signed up for public comment? MS. DIPENTINO: No, sir.

TRUSTEE WAUGH: We have Item III, to accept the 1 2 agenda. 3 CHAIR ROGERS: Thank you. See I'm -- you all got me thinking about Thursday Night Football. Messed me up. So let me 4 5 slow down. And then Nate's challenged me with his record or a 6 meeting, so all those things come playing in my mind at the same 7 time. 8 So slowing down, Agenda Item No. III, Board action to 9 accept the proposed agenda. Do we have a motion? 10 TRUSTEE WAUGH: Move to approve. CHAIR ROGERS: Do we have a second? 11 VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Second. 12 13 CHAIR ROGERS: Any questions? [No heard response.] 14 15 All right, call for the question. All those in favor, say aye. [ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT] 16 CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed? 17 [No heard response.] 18 All right. Motion carries. 19 Agenda Item No. IV, Approval of the proposed minutes. 20 Now, is it okay to do these as one or do we need to break it out one 21 at a time -- one set --22 23 COUNSEL WELT: Unless there's a change, you can do it all together. 24 CHAIR ROGERS: Well, let me ask Trustees, have you 25

1 reviewed the Minutes, the four sets? Are there any changes that 2 you need to have implemented? 3 TRUSTEE WAUGH: Mr. Chair, I move to approve IV.A, B, C and D. 4 5 CHAIR ROGERS: All right. 6 VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Second. 7 CHAIR ROGERS: Do we have a second? 8 Any questions? 9 [No heard response.] 10 All right. All those in favor, say aye. [ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT] 11 CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed? 12 13 [No heard response.] All right. Motion carries. 14 Now we're on Agenda V. We're going to go to the Chair's 15 Report, and I'll start with my update. And I just want to say, I know 16 it'll be part of the Library Reports, but I just want to acknowledge 17 some of the things that I observed in the reports, starting with our 18 community engagement. 19 And not that you need to come to the podium, but I just 20 want to just sort of acknowledge the Summer Challenge. Year over 21 22 year, we had increases in participants, completed activities, and 23 minutes read. So that's certainly a testament to the outreach of the entire library team, as well as just making sure that we have 24 25 facilities prepared to support all the activity. And so it's really

appreciated.

I've heard a lot from the community in terms of just the importance of the Summer Challenge and how they really look forward to that participation. So Matt, thank you for leading that effort. It's definitely noticing --making a difference in the community.

And then another --

SECRETARY FOYT: You may wish to talk to Branding and Marketing because that --

CHAIR ROGERS: Yes. And Betsy --

SECRETARY FOYT: -- fuels the Summer Challenge.

CHAIR ROGERS: Betsy and her team as well on the marketing side. Thank you for that, Trustee Foyt. But we know it's a team effort. So thank you all involved.

Also, I want to call attention to under Leo's report, just recognizing that, you know, we are giving out more devices in terms of our circulation of laptops and hotspots over the summer. So that's something else I know that's critically important to families and their kids over the summer. So certainly appreciate that effort and being able to support students over the summer.

And then also I recognize that we had an increase in participation for our homeschool families as well. So we're really doing a great job with supporting our entire library community over the summer while students and families are on vacations and trying to reduce that summer melt so that students have something

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productive to do and positive to do over the summer.

And then also I want to give a shout out to John. I had a chance to go and visit the West Side Library, and it exceeded my expectations since I was there a couple months ago in terms of the progress. And if you haven't been there to see it in person, I really challenge you to make time to go and see it. It is breathtaking. So John, great job.

And then also I want to give you some kudos on the Goodsprings Library progress. I read that we have the initial rezoning approval by the town of Goodsprings Citizen Advisory Board. So I know there's still some more steps to go for getting that facility up and running, but we are trending in the right direction and we're making a difference on all fronts.

So for those reports that I didn't sort of call out, you know, it's not to mean that you're not doing a great job as well. You know, I was very pleased overall with all the reports, so.

And so I will pause there. And then also regarding the next item, which is Las Vegas Library Foundation, I don't have an update there. We are just still waiting to hear back from the Foundation Team in terms of since our last meeting to finalize the agreement. And once we have that information from them, we will convene again and hopefully finalize negotiations, then come back to the Board in terms of here's what the proposal will look like. And then we'll call for the guestion and see where that leaves us in terms of our memorialized relationship with the Foundation.

So that concludes my update. Trustees, did you have anything to add under my Chair's Report that made something -- that may be beneficial that you want to share?

TRUSTEE JONES: I just want to echo your sentiments for John. Thank you. He assisted me. I led a tour -- he led the tour for the historic west -- or the West Las Vegas Library, but it was for some of our community elders. So these are folks who've been around the Library District since it was at the mosque, as we say, over on D Street. And it was definitely more than a notion.

So thank you for your patience. They were going to get upstairs, and they did do that, but just really appreciate you. They are still talking about it. And I've seen a lot of tours since then on social media. So the community is really excited. So thank you.

TRUSTEE WILLIAMS: I'd also like to ditto all those comments. I appreciate you doing the same tour. You took former Councilman Cedric Crear, Dr. Morris Hibbler, and our newest deputy city manager. So it was an awesome opportunity for some folks who really laid the groundwork to get this whole thing started and they really, really appreciate it. So thank you very much.

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Chair, if I can really quick. Just echoing everything that you said about summer. It's so important that programming from Three Square, to Summer Reading Challenge, to access to devices is so hugely important. And I know that summer runs right into back to school, so all of y'all are just moving right on to the next thing. So thank you for

two seasons in a row of really supporting our community who really needs it.

I also noticed we had a 30-year team member retire over the summer and that's -- I think something that's just really special to celebrate people who stayed with the District for 30 years. So I think Leo included that. So thank you to Leslie Valdez, who was with us for 30 years in volunteer management.

I was also really excited to see in the innovation report about working on Al through BiblioCommons and what that's going to be like. So that's exciting to see that we're staying cutting edge. Thanks for that.

CHAIR ROGERS: Okay. All right. Thank you for contributing to the Chair's Report, fellow Trustees.

We will move to Agenda Item VI, the Library Reports. I turn it over to Floresto.

MR. CABIAS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

For the record, Floresto Cobias, Chief Financial Officer here representing Executive Director Watson tonight. The Executive Director's report isn't available at this time, but as requested by Chair Rogers, I'm happy to share an update or a highlight summary of the Finance and Audit Committee meeting that took place earlier this week.

First, I wanted to share the good news that the District closed a second round of funding under the New Markets and Nevada Jobs Act programs that raised \$4 million towards

construction costs of the new West Las Vegas Library Project. And that's on top of another \$6.5 million that was raised last year under the programs, which brings us to a total of \$11 million for supporting a \$40 million project.

And if I may, Mr. Chair, I'd like to acknowledge one more time for the record all the parties involved with making this happen, from the leadership of Executive Director Watson to the hard work of staff such as Mr. Vino, who is not only building this library, but helped raise \$11 million for it. Of course, there's our community development partners and all of the Trustees here who worked very quickly to pass special resolutions, along with the Directors of the QALICB Board and the Library Foundation Board.

We covered the financials at the Committee meeting earlier this week to discuss the financial position of the District as of June 30th, 2025, which is the end of the library's fiscal year. The CTX or consolidated sales tax revenue came in flat compared to 2024, and slightly under budget, but it's nice to see that there wasn't a steep decline in revenues for Fiscal Year 2025.

We also talked about looking at the year ahead and what the economic picture might look like for the District. And I didn't emphasize enough the importance of the property tax revenues. Although the CTX revenues are volatile, they change from month to month, and it's hard to predict, the property tax revenues are very reliable as far as predicting that amount. We collected \$69 million in property tax revenues in Fiscal Year 2025, and the budget for

2026 is \$76 million, which is an 11 percent increase. And staff is highly confident that we will collect every dollar of those property tax revenues.

On the expenditure side, we underspent in the General Fund saving \$12 million compared to the budget. That was mostly due to personnel costs. The District has an ongoing practice of budgeting personnel costs or positions at 100 percent, knowing that turnover is going to generate savings. And that practice has served the District well over the years. It helps us manage vacancies and also make adjustments to positions depending on staffing needs.

So the savings there, along with the consistent revenues we've been receiving, combined to give the District a healthy fund balance at the end of Fiscal Year 2025, and that allowed us to transfer \$16.5 million to the Capital Projects Fund. Of course, the ending fund balance is always important because not only does it allow us to invest in capital projects in upcoming years, such as the West Las Vegas project, it also cushions us from economic downturns, and it allows us to absorb costs from natural factors such as inflation or renewals of contracts.

The Board will see that there are a few contracts on the agenda tonight, and I wanted to let you know that the District's budget is well prepared to handle those costs because of our strong financial position.

I'd like to also encourage the Trustees to attend the next Finance and Audit Committee meeting in November, because staff

1 will be prepared to provide another update then, and the auditors 2 will also be there to present the results of their audit, which begins 3 next week. 4 I could probably go on for another 30 minutes, but I want 5 to give Chair Rogers a chance to beat Dr. Waugh's record for 6 meeting times tonight, so I'll turn it over to you. Thank you, Mr. 7 Chair. 8 CHAIR ROGERS: Well, I won't -- tonight's not the meeting 9 to challenge that. It's going to have to be a different meeting. We 10 got too much new business, so -- but there will be -- I still got more 11 meetings before I'm no longer Chair so still some my opportunity. Thank you for that. 12 13 I want to give my fellow Trustees an opportunity to see if there are any reports that were submitted that you wanted to call? 14 15 SECRETARY FOYT: I would like to ask Leo -- is it possible 16 to ask Leo a few questions? CHAIR ROGERS: Yes, of course. 17 SECRETARY FOYT: Have we replaced the volunteer 18 coordinator? 19 MR. SEGURA: We have not yet replaced the volunteer 20 coordinator. 21 SECRETARY FOYT: But there will be --22 23 MR. SEGURA: Yeah --SECRETARY FOYT: -- somebody --24 25 MR. SEGURA: -- we're working on rewriting the position

description so that -- kind of broaden their responsibilities a little bit so that their focus is more on the volunteers and less focused on the -- just the Bookstore.

SECRETARY FOYT: Okay, that's good.

The other thing I wanted to ask is, I did notice the statistics as far as the homeschool program, the number of people, I mean, it's really on the rise. Are we -- how is that impacting your staffing needs? I mean, are you having to adjust? Do you have enough staff to work with?

MR. SEGURA: Thank you for the question. Yeah. So with the homeschool, what we're using is we're activating our Homework Help Centers in the times that they're not being utilized for homework help. So from 10:00 in the morning until generally 2:00 in the afternoon, they're usually shuttered and closed because they're -- kids are at school. But the homeschool kids that are in the library, so that they're not having to pay for a rental room or something, we've made it so that they could rent the Homework Help Center at a zero cost.

SECRETARY FOYT: So it dovetails between the two --

MR. SEGURA: So --

SECRETARY FOYT: -- programs. Yeah.

MR. SEGURA: -- they can use it for a two-hour period from 10:00 to 12:00 or 12:00 to 2:00, and then it turns over into the active use by the community from 2:00 to 7:00, so that they can access Brainfuse or Homework Help laptops or IXL. And

sometimes some of our branches have UNLV America Reads 1 2 America Counts tutors that are there to help the kids with their 3 homework. SECRETARY FOYT: Thank you. Thank you. I appreciate 4 5 that. 6 MR. SEGURA: Yeah, my pleasure. 7 CHAIR ROGERS: Trustees, the mics are open for you if 8 you have any reports you would like to follow up on. SECRETARY FOYT: I have one other. 9 10 CHAIR ROGERS: Okay, if not, I'm going to do my three Mississippis and close it. 11 SECRETARY FOYT: I have one other. 12 13 CHAIR ROGERS: Trustee Foyt. SECRETARY FOYT: I was dazzled by the amount of grants 14 that were reported in Kelvin's --15 CHAIR ROGERS: Yes. 16 SECRETARY FOYT: -- report. I mean, it's really 17 impressive. I have no idea -- oh, there we go -- for that. But that's 18 really quite a record. 19 20 CHAIR ROGERS: I would agree. We have a lot of irons in the fire. 21 SECRETARY FOYT: We do. 22 23 CHAIR ROGERS: A lot of opportunities. SECRETARY FOYT: And results. 24 CHAIR ROGERS: Yes, and some results in already. 25

SECRETARY FOYT: Yes. 1 2 CHAIR ROGERS: So we're certainly trending in the right 3 direction. SECRETARY FOYT: Thank you. 4 5 CHAIR ROGERS: All right. Trustees online, any reports or questions you would like to speak to before we close this agenda 6 7 item? 8 [No heard response.] 9 All right. I did my three Mississippis. 10 All right. So we're going to close that item. We're going to move to Agenda Item VII. We have -- oh, sorry. Thank you for 11 that. 12 13 Do we have a motion to accept the reports? SECRETARY FOYT: I do so move. 14 VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: So moved. 15 CHAIR ROGERS: Do we have a second? 16 TRUSTEE WILLIAMS: I second. 17 CHAIR ROGERS: All right. All those in favor, say aye. 18 [ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT] 19 CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed? 20 [No heard response.] 21 All right. Motion carries. 22 23 Now we can go to Agenda Item VII, Unfinished Business. We have nothing to my knowledge under Unfinished Business. 24 25 We will transition to Agenda Item VIII, which is New

Business where we do have a few items. So we'll start with our 1 2 consent agenda. The consent agenda may be approved in its 3 entirety by motion or individual items may be considered 4 separately. 5 TRUSTEE WAUGH: Mr. Chair, I move to accept the 6 consent agenda or to approve the consent agenda. 7 CHAIR ROGERS: Do we have a second? 8 VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Second. 9 CHAIR ROGERS: Do we have any questions? 10 [No heard response.] All right. All those in favor, say aye. 11 [ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT] 12 13 CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed? [No heard response.] 14 15 All right. Motion carries. 16 Going to our regular agenda item, we will start with Agenda Item No. I, which is discussion and possible Board action to 17 approve a joinder with Clark County for the purchase of general 18 office supplies from Staples. 19 MR. VINO: Good evening, everyone. John Vino, General 20 Services Director for the record. 21 22 The background on this is funds are allocated in a General 23 Fund to purchase general office supplies for the District. Nevada statutes and Board policy requires that a request for bids be 24 advertised for purchases exceeding 750,000 within a fiscal year. 25

This contract last year was around \$242,000 worth of office supplies.

In lieu of advertising requests for bids, the District may in accordance with NRS 332.195 use a previously bid contract for government entity with the authorization of the contracting vendor. Clark County has in place a contract for general office supplies with Staples. The contract office discounts and requires no minimum purchase. The contract is for one year and the contract will renew annually. Staples has authorized our use of the county contract. The District has previously joindered and the Board has approved joindering with Clark County for a contract with Staples.

So our recommendation action is a motion to authorize staff to utilize Clark County contracts with Staples for the purchase and direct delivery of general office supplies and to authorize staff to extend the contract for the remaining one-year renewal subject to funding being available and the vendor continuing to meet specifications as outlined in the contract documents.

Happy to answer any questions on this one.

CHAIR ROGERS: I have one question, then I'll turn it to the Board to see if they have any questions.

You mentioned about the joinder with Clark County government. What's the end date of the existing contract they have with Staples?

MR. VINO: 2029. It's not with -- well, it's with Staples through a company called Sourcewell. We -- is a general

1 procurement fund that government agencies can join. And we have 2 access to larger contracts like this that give us these benefits. Clark 3 County -- it's an annual contract. It's available to us as long as 4 we're a member of Sourcewell and the county continues to have it. 5 We'll renew it every year, just as a matter of policy. 6 CHAIR ROGERS: Is there a limit to how many one-year 7 renewals you can do through this process? 8 MR. VINO: As long as -- no. As long as the county has the 9 contract in effect, we can renew through 2029. 10 CHAIR ROGERS: Okay. Thank you. MR. VINO: And we'll bring it back annually. 11 CHAIR ROGERS: Okay. Thank you. 12 13 I'll see if any of my fellow Trustees have any follow-up questions. 14 15 [No heard response.] 16 All right. TRUSTEE WAUGH: Mr. Chair? 17 CHAIR ROGERS: Have a motion? 18 TRUSTEE WAUGH: I move to authorize staff to utilize 19 Clark County's contract with Staples for the purchase and direct 20 delivery of general office supplies and to authorize staff to extend 21 22 the contract for the remaining one-year renewal subject to funding 23 being available and the vendor continuing to meet specifications as outlined in the contract documents. 24 25 CHAIR ROGERS: All right. Do we have a second?

TREASURER DUTKOWSKI: I'll second.

CHAIR ROGERS: All right. All those in favor, say aye.

[ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT]

CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed?

[No heard response.]

All right. Motion carries.

We will transition to Agenda Item No. II, discussion and possible Board action regarding contract award for theatrical lighting and accessories for various District theaters.

MR. VINO: And I will apologize, this is actually for West Las Vegas, not various, so.

Funds are allocated in the Capital Projects Fund to purchase replacement, theatrical lighting, and accessories for the new West Las Vegas Library. An invitation to bid was advertised in the Review Journal, posted in the District websites, emailed to Minority Chamber of Commerce, and posted on Nevada Government e-Marketplace, NGEM. The bids were opened on July 27, 2025. We did receive a total of 13 bids, and we listed the bids received.

The lowest responsive and responsible bidder is a company called Sound Productions. We've worked with them before. The disclosure of ownership and principal forms for Sound Productions is attached to the agenda item. Sound Productions' low bid was \$92,333.

Our recommendation is a motion to authorize staff to

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award a contract for the purchase of replacement theatrical lighting in accordance with Bid 26-02, to Sound Productions for the amount of 92,333. It is replacement in the sense that when we sold the current West Las Vegas theater to the city, we made a commitment to leave a lot of our theatrical lighting so that that theater can keep -- and be in operation, so. And then this is mostly for the events center at the new West Las Vegas Library.

CHAIR ROGERS: Thank you. Any questions? VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: No questions. Mr. Chair, I move to authorize staff to award a contract for the purchase of replacement theatrical lighting in accordance with Bid No. 26-02

TRUSTEE WAUGH: Second.

CHAIR ROGERS: All right. All those in favor?

[ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT]

CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed?

[No heard response.]

All right. Motion carries.

Moving to Agenda Item B.3., Discussion and possible Board action regarding contract award to Dustland Studio LLC for architectural and engineering services for the new Goodsprings Library conversion -- conversation.

MR. VINO: Dustland Studios LLC is a full-service architectural foam[sic], specifically with experience converting residential structures to commercial use. They have been our

architect of record for the rezoning of the new Goodsprings property from residential to public. This scope of service would be for the change of use of the building from residential to library.

Their contract scope work includes full architectural engineering services, including design development, construction documents, bidding, construction, project administration. Their disclosure of ownership principles for Dustland Studios LLC is attached.

We're asking for a motion to authorize staff to award a contract to provide architectural services for the Goodsprings Library conversion to Dustland LLC in the amount of \$69,300, plus any authorized reimbursable expenses subject to final review by counsel.

A lot of this stuff was needed in advance, so it's really just a continuation of the documents we had to create to have it rezoned. Once we get it rezoned, we move into Phase II, which is changing the use. And it is a little bit complicated, changing the residential structure. It's -- there's a lot of engineering that has to be done. We have to put in a commercial grade foundation, not a residential. We have to actually lift the unit up, you know, and pour a new slab and things along those lines.

This team's been great to work with. They've really helped us along. And this would really just be an extension of their existing contract.

CHAIR ROGERS: Okay, thank you.

Any questions, Trustees? 1 2 [No heard response.] 3 Do we have a motion? 4 TRUSTEE WAUGH: Mr. Chair, I move to authorize staff to 5 award a contract to provide architectural services for the 6 Goodsprings Library conversion to Dustland Studio LLC in the 7 amount of \$69,300, plus authorized reimbursable expenses subject 8 to final review by counsel. 9 CHAIR ROGERS: Second? 10 TRUSTEE WILLIAMS: I'll second. CHAIR ROGERS: All those in favor, say aye. 11 [ALL BOARD MEMBERS WERE IN AGREEMENT] 12 13 CHAIR ROGERS: Any opposed? [No heard response.] 14 All right. Motion carries. 15 Moving on to the next agenda item, which is discussion 16 and possible Board action regarding contract awards for 17 maintenance services. 18 MR. VINO: Okay. So contracts for janitorial maintenance 19 services for all District facilities expire on September 30th, 2025. 20 21 The request for bid proposal was advertised in the Review Journal, 22 posted on the District's website, emailed to Minority Chamber of 23 Commerce, and posted on NGEM. A pre-bid conference was held on July 22nd, 2025, with the proposal opening on August 22nd, 24 2025. 25

A total of ten bids were received. One proposal was deemed non-responsive and subsequently rejected. A committee compromising of general services, as well as library operations staff conducted a thorough evaluation of the proposals. The process involved the scoring and ranking of each proposal to establish a finalist for each group.

The evaluation criteria and weighted values included:

Demonstrated experience of a contractor and its key personnel was worth 30 percent.

Experience in performing of comparable services and engagements was 24.

Staff selection, training, retention, supervision, 20 percent.

Proposed billable rates is 18.

Operating procedures, reports and documents, 5.

Uniforms and identity badges, 3.

Following the proposed evaluation results, Bid Group I, which is kind of our urban plus Laughlin, Blue Diamond, Indian Springs, Mount Charleston and Searchlight, best janitorial, scored the highest at 899, with a first-year price of 1,882,320.

And then Bid Group II, which is Mesquite Library, the Learning Center, Moapa Town, and Moapa Valley, again, best janitorial had their high score at 910 at a rate of \$177,840.

F&P Management Services LLC was the company that was deemed non-responsive.

Based on our evaluation, the responsive and responsible

contract that submitted the most comprehensive and advantageous proposal to the District for Bid Group I was Best Janitorial Services, as well as Bid Group II, Best Janitorial Services. As a matter of transparency, they are our current janitorial service as well.

The bid documents provided for an initial term of one year with an option to extend the contract for up to four additional one-year periods, provided the contractor's performance remains satisfactory.

The disclosure of ownership principles for Best Janitorial, they are, as a matter of record, just a very locally owned family-owned minority business located here in Las Vegas.

I do include a category for a potential formal protest, but none was received.

So our recommended action for this item is a motion to authorize staff to award contracts for janitorial maintenance services in accordance with RFP No. 26-01 for Bid Group I to best Janitorial in the amount of \$1,882,320. And for Bid Group II to Best Janitorial Services of Nevada for an annual bid -- annual amount of 177,840.

And to authorize staff to extend the contracts in subsequent years, subject to funding being available in the contract to continue to meet standard outlines -- the standards outlined in the documents and of course subject to counsel's review.

Happy to answer. It's a big one, so -VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Mr. Vino --

MR. VINO: -- any --

VICE CHAIR TURN

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: -- have they been our contractor?

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: -- how long --

MR. VINO: About 15 years now.

MR. VINO: -- happy to answer --

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Okay.

MR. VINO: I think this might be the 3rd or 4th renewal.

I'm probably the only one that has been on an evaluation committee. So I really -- I picked four people that wasn't familiar to get a fresh look at them. And they were unanimously -- independently, unanimously selected to move forward.

This is one of the few RFPs that you'll see us bring to you that isn't based really on low bid, because it's a quarter of a billion dollars roughly worth of District assets, including a brand new \$40 million library, we look first at experience. Who are your clients? Can you handle 22 libraries? Can you handle the emergencies? You know, do you have the infrastructure to manage this big a contract? It's almost 750,000 square feet of space every single night. You know, three million square feet of carpeting and flooring a year. It's a very complex contract. It's a complex bid. We make them walk every single property and come to pre-bid meetings, you know.

And so when we sit down to evaluate this type of contract, when we get nine and ten, we're very strict. You have different

 contractors that apply. We're just very strict in making sure you have the experience that you can move and do what this District needs. Best Janitorial has -- like I said, has been with us a while. They've come through COVID with us. We also lock in the prices for five years. So over the last five years, that's been beneficial to us, you know, with some CPIs being in the sevens, and I think the average over the five years was just under five, and we were locked in at under four.

And we were able to do the same thing. You know, we don't know where CPI will be over the next five years, you know, but there's a lot of -- still with everything going on with the economy and tariffs and the market. We just move forward with locking in the five-year contract for the next five years as well.

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: And just out of curiosity, how much of an increase is this over the previous --

SECRETARY FOYT: We can't hear you.

MR. VINO: It's very small. It's --

CHAIR ROGERS: Is your mic on?

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Yes.

MR. VINO: It's around 2.49 percent, so below CPI. And if you take out -- it's a little more -- because of West Vegas it's changing from 17,000. So I think their overall contract increase is only 92,000 over what we're currently paying. And then if you take out the difference of what we're paying in West Vegas, of course, obviously the new West Las Vegas is twice as big and the contract's

a little more, it's down to like 42,000. So they were very competitive.

And again, they're not the lowest bidder, but I mean, it's one of the things we struggle with because we tell everybody what our current price is. So it's not very difficult for other vendors to try to low bid. And that's one of the things we're careful about, you know, when we really dig into it. So that's where we're at.

VICE CHAIR TURNER WHITELEY: Thanks for the transparency.

CHAIR ROGERS: Thank you. Any other questions? [No heard response.]

TRUSTEE WAUGH: Mr. Chair, I move to authorize staff to award contracts for janitorial maintenance services in accordance with RFP No. 26-01 for Bid Group I to Best Janitorial Services of Nevada for the annual amount of \$1,882,320, and for Bid Group II to the Best Janitorial Services of Nevada for the annual amount of \$177,840.

And to authorize staff to extend the contracts in subsequent years subject to funding being available and the contractor continuing to meet performance standards outlined in the bid documents subject to counsel's review.

This memorandum reports on the Library Operations Department's activities and project updates for September 2025, as well as Branch activities and **analytics** compiled between **August 1 and August 31, 2025.**

Powerful People

 Participated on Dolly Parton's Imagination Library meeting with Executive Director Watson.

By the Numbers (August 2025):

- The Library District signed up **8,875** new **library card** users, a 20% decrease over the same month last year.
- Gate count was 323,521, a 4% decrease from the same month last year.
- During the month, staff answered **30,600 reference questions**.
- Library staff also conducted 64 curbside deliveries for 223 items. This was a 16% reduction.
- Our volunteers logged 2,051 service hours in the Library District in August.
- 346 Homeschool sessions were logged, totaling a 146% increase over last year.
- A Librarian from Slovenia, Aljaz, reached out to Michael Stellar to find out about the Flamingo Film Club, which Clark County Adult Services Staff runs every month on the fourth Thursday of the month except for November and December due to holidays. The club typically meets for an hour, from 6:00 to 7:00 pm. Sometimes it will go a bit longer due to us having an excellent discussion and room availability. Example, last December, we were doing a comparison between Murder on the Orient Express (1974) and Murder on the Orient Express [TV Jul 11, 2010] starring David Suchet. Michael asked the attendees if they agreed with Poirot [Suchet] in his summation that "the law must be preserved regardless if you feel justice was not served," rather than taking the law into our own hands where we become savages in the streets«? The discussion got [heated] and we just kept going.

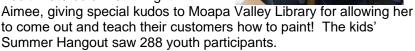
Other interesting happenings at the Clark County Library included Dee's Chess Club attracting an international grand master stopped in to play chess with the group.

The Word Power Writers Group, on August 9th, had 16 attendees who shared their work and offered feedback to the work of others in the group.

Starting a Nonprofit in Nevada workshop at the SoNNPIC (Southern Nevada Non-Profit Center) registered twelve (12) students.

In August we proudly celebrated the completion of the first year of our Best Buy Teen Tech, Career Pathways Cohort—and what an incredible journey it's been! We launched the program with our goal of 10 teens and are thrilled to share that six of them completed both their coursework and 15 internship hours. To honor their hard work and growth, we hosted a celebration where the teens shared powerful lessons they had learned from their internships, including the challenges they faced in customer service and navigating workplace dynamics with coworkers. This year, we received \$13,000 to support the program, and every dollar was invested directly into the teens' experiences. Here's to an even bigger and better Year 2!





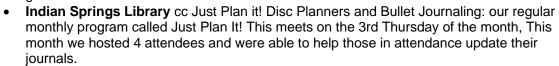


- Centennial Hills Library hosted a Back to School Slime Week, drawing in 1,038 people to see their favorite librarian or politician get slimed.
- East Las Vegas Library hosted Mobile Showers (Clean the World). Character Development When Writing Children's Books (Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators) had a successful program with 13 participants. Youth Services Staff



hosted five (5) Play and Learn programs for 121. University of Reno Extension: Kickoff to Kindergarten supported 1,400.

- Enterprise Library book sale was \$1985.65. Popular partnership programs included Three-Square Kids Café, Las Vegas Tickets; Yoga for Life; L'Ve Hall, Las Vegas Battle Jackets, Mission Mahjong, American Red Cross, Destination Pebbles, Kevin Nowak, Desert Quilters.
- Goodsprings Library Assicuate Raychel participated in the
 Citizen Advisory Council: attended and presented as part of the
 agenda the upcoming events at the Goodsprings Library and in
 the Labor Day event and unveiling of the GS Community
 Center Remodel, participated in human slot machine and
 helped with cookout, etc. The temperature snake continues to
 grow in size.



Game events: We are still hosting our two types of game days for our branch. We took our Adult Game Retreat from the summer and continued it on weekdays from 12-2pm, with a slight delay on Afterthoughts Book Club mornings for a 1-3pm program. Having a game retreat is beneficial to them as an "excuse" to get out and come to the Library while building relationships with our community members. This is a passive program

that can be initiated by staff or customers. This program is either very well attended or not attended at all, but it is a passive program for our staff and allows us to connect to our community when they come in. We had 11 game meet ups.

Book Bedazzle: We hosted our second book bedazzle event on August 19th and had a great turnout. We invited our patrons to bring a book to the library where they make them fancy.



• Mesquite Library hosted their first Open Mic & Open Read -Total attendance: 25 – Thank you Vanessa! Thirteen people shared their poetry, short stories, history, and life advice. We had a participant as young as 12 and one born in 1936, so I think we covered all the bases. It was inspirational listening to the young voices who will shape the future and the wise words of those who have lived through history. We felt emotions through their words that left us all wanting more. Planning will begin shortly for another event in November. There was positive feedback from everyone who participated!



Moapa Town Library reported they completed their final storytimes of the summer with the summer rec kids from the rec center next door and began our pre-school storytimes again once school started. Four (4) storytimes in August with a total of 35 kids attending, which is about 9 or 10 for each session.



- Moapa Valley Library Ashley and Aimée are currenty working out how to fill the new 8x4x2 foot planter with soil so we can have the Story Time children help take care of the plants. Kris has contacted Bowler Elementary to request that we continue to read stories to the 2nd and 3rd grades again this year. This program is scheduled to resume on September 5th.
- Rainbow Library hosted 59 programs with 2,092 people in attendance. Scavenger Hunts and Back to school were the largest draws.
- Sandy Valley Library LEGO Club every Tuesday, Seniors' Computer Class every Wednesday, and Outreach Book Club every other Thursday, Film Club every Friday, Art Class for kids & adults every Saturday.
- At Searchlight Library Books within the adult section have been rearranged; fiction is now in the non-fiction area and vice versa. This change has infused new energy into the book stacks, providing a refreshing update to the collection. By shifting the materials and creating engaging displays, we've revitalized the space.



- What's Gnu? featuring Playaway was the feature bookdisplay for Summerlin in August. Adult Services' 14 programs brought in a total of 145 customers. Youth Services' 5 programs brought in a total of 600 customers. DMPL went live on 8/18, and the signage was installed on 8/27. Staff worked hard all month to assist customers with the new TBS system, which was not accepting payments in Adult Services for the majority of the month. Customers frequently expressed frustration, including two comment card submissions.
- Sunrise Library customers were very excited about the BOGO to clear out some discarded items. Kudos to Bookstore Coordinator Natalie and everyone at CIRC and Adult involved with the bookstore sales totaling \$426.50. Youth Services staff attended the Meet and Greet events for Diaz ES, Cortez ES, and Mountain View ES. Collectively, staff spoke to 903 new customers!
- Spring Valley Library Back to School Fair was a huge hit! We had DJ Morgan and Anahi setting the mood with hip back to school tunes. We had over a dozen vendors ranging from health and wellness to education. Raising Canes also showed up with their amazing lemonade for all to enjoy!!
- **Sahara West Library Bookstore** sold Bookstore receipts = \$4,559.85.
- Parkinson's Place of Las Vegas still has a solid turnout for their meetings. This month, they had an attendance of 30 for a presentation on a new drug treatment for those dealing with Parkinson's. Blood Drives continue to have a big turnout with both Vitalant and ARC reporting they are hitting over their goals on appointments and walk ins every
- The Be Well Fun Fair was a massive success at the West Charleston Library. Additionally, Staff made & distributed 302 bookmarks at the Customer Service Desk, 973 coloring pages taken from children's display book shelf in lobby. Kudos to:
 - Anita's Action and Adventure DVD cart had 29 trivia sheets were taken.

- Brenna's Ghibli lobby cart had 30 Studio Ghibli bookmarks and one 3D Totoro picked up from the display.
- Allesha Hallmark cart had 15 checklists handed out to customers.
- Nina created a new display cart highlighting Art Creation & History in which 100 activity pages and 89 bookmarks were taken. She has 3D printed prizes for a trivia contest.
- Allesha created a fun Minecraft Back to School display on the Customer Service Desk.
- Linda attended the General Services BM Meeting – online.
- o Brenna assisted the Writing Club Program on August 23rd.
- Linda, Allesha, Anita, Jamillex. Brenna and Nina completed the Annual IT Compliance Training.

- West Las Vegas Library Customer Service Team Lead Emma went on back-to-school outreach to Fitzgerald Elementary and Booker Elementary with Youth Services Assistant All department staff participated in shadowing at the Clark County Library. Department head Lorraine filled in at the Branch Managers meeting with General Services. In partnership with Three Square food bank, Youth Services served over 700 meals to hungry children this month. Chess Club was held 4 times with 55 participants, offering opportunities for strategy, learning, and social interaction.

By the Numbers (August 2025):

- Library Branches improved overall circulation to 1,032,598 items, an increase of 4% over the same month last year.

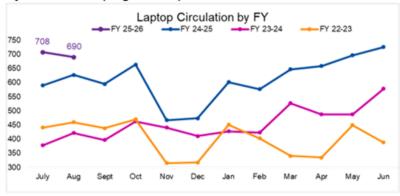

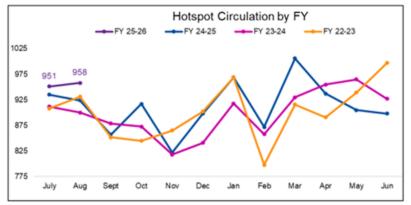

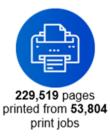

This memorandum reports on the security information and analytics compiled from **August 01**, **to August 31**, **2025**.

In **August 2025**, branch staff reported **92 incidents**, representing a 2.2% decrease over the same month in the previous year. During this period, the Library District recorded **323,521** customer visits. **This ratio** is one incident for every **3,516 visits**.

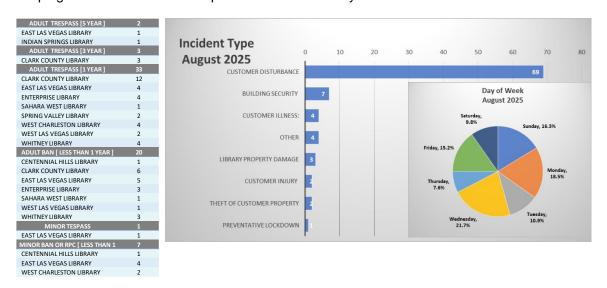
Clark County Library experienced the highest number of incidents at twenty-seven (27). The other branches received between zero (0) and eighteen (18). The East Las Vegas Library had the largest increase in incidents, up twelve (12).

August matched bucked the overall trend of an minimal increase but matched the decline from two years ago. Causing a disturbance, harassing and hostile language and behavior, and drug

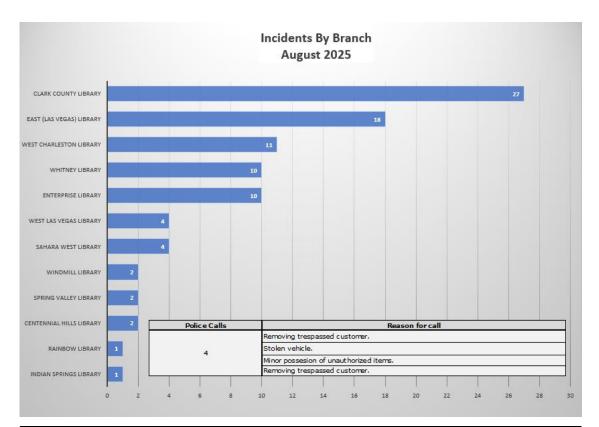
or alcohol use were frequently cited in the large number of customer disturbances. Other incidents included customers who were trespassed returning to a branch.



The August incident reports trend lines for this time of year and were slightly lower than the annual norm. The Clark County Library saw significant improvements; however, four (4) other branches experienced increases. Clark County continues to submit **FIXIT Tickets** as needed through the County's portal. The county and Las Vegas Metro continue to clear encampments on a routine basis to ensure the removal of encampments adjacent to library property, thereby keeping the street and sidewalk passable and the library accessible.



District staff encountered **Sixty-nine (69) customer disturbances**, accounting for 75% of August incidents or one disturbance for every **4,688** visits. During **August 2025**, staff banned sixty-six **(66)** customers. Two (2) adults received a five-year trespass, three (3) adults received a three-year trespass, thirty-three (33) adults received a one-year trespass, and twenty (20) adults received a ban of under one year. One (1) minor received a one-year trespass, and seven (7) teens received a request for a parental conference and a ban of less than a year.

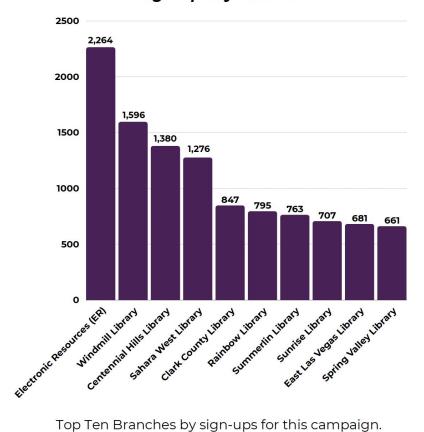

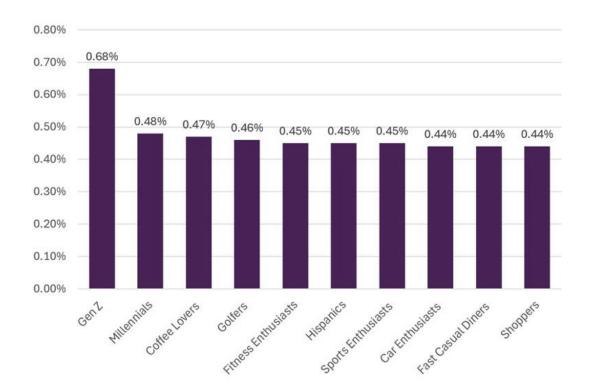

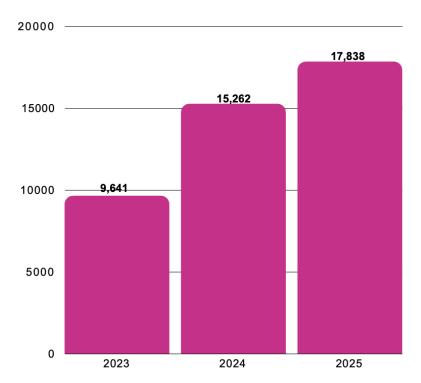

Branch Library Highlights eNewsletters

These are emailed monthly through the **OrangeBoy system to cardholders**, **based on their home branch zip codes** – creating a sense of community among neighbors.

- Emails were sent out to all 25 branches' active cardholders residing in the respective service area zip codes on August 28.
- The average open rate for our 25 branch eNewsletters was 32.4%, with an average Click Through Rate (CTR) of 2.2%. This shows our cardholders are actively looking forward to hearing from their home library.
- 879 Occasionals were Re-engaged.
- 306 Inactives were Reengaged.
- 1,886 physical items were checked out from the Library District's catalog.
- 3,654 items were checked out from Overdrive.
- 883 items were checked out from Hoopla.

Google AdWords Grant Update

Overview of the Campaign's Benefits:

- Google AdWords is Google's online advertising platform, in which advertisers bid on popular keywords and search phrases for their clickable text-based ads to appear in Google's search results.
- The Foundation and the Library District have received a grant from Google for approximately \$10,000 per month in Google AdWords credits (or up to \$100,000 per year).
- Google connected BAM with Nonprofit Megaphone (NPM), an agency that specializes in executing the Google Grant, to optimize designated keywords that are selected

from Library District and Foundation priorities and promoted through TheLibraryDistrict.org.

- When users search Google using our designated keywords, the Google AdWords
 campaign entices them to click on Library District search results, increasing the
 opportunity for discovery of our programs and services. For example, when someone
 Googles "art galleries in Las Vegas," Google will produce the Library District's free art
 galleries in the ad search results if we are the top bidder for that keyword search.
- These monthly Google Grant campaigns increase our overall Google SEO and drive more qualified traffic to our website.

Monthly Campaign Results:

Conversation tracking for priority Google AdWords campaigns (August 2025):

- Our Google Grant campaigns generated 2,145 Total Clicks, which is a decrease of -52% from the previous month. Our ads had 19,976 impressions, which is down -13% from July. This can be attributed to Google pausing our Google Grant in error on August 15. Our account manager at NPM said the same situation has happened to other accounts they manage, and each time, NPM have confirmed with Google that it's a glitch and Google have reactivated the Google Grant accounts within a few business days. This was the case with our account, and it was reinstated on August 26. This did impact all our monthly Google Grant analytics while our account was paused for 11 days. We will see our normal account performance resume in September.
- Our Google Ads CTR (Click Through Rate) was 12.37%, which is down -46% month-overmonth. This is also due to Google mistakenly pausing our Google Grant. As detailed in previous Board Reports, Google's recent algorithm updates, including the rollout of Al Overviews, have impacted overall user search behavior and made it more challenging to maintain Google Ads click-through rates (CTR) in double digits. As a result, our Google Grant ad campaign analytics now fluctuate more, depending on keyword competition and evolving platform dynamics. Despite these industry-wide shifts, the Library District remains competitive thanks to our ongoing work with NPM.
- The Library District continues to be **one of NPM's top-performing accounts**, as the network average is only 3%, and the Google requirement is 5%. This means that Google continues to show our ads to the right people and that our Google Ads are performing as required.
- There were **26 instant eCard applications completed** from our Google Ads campaign, which was down **-41% month-over-month.**
- Clark County Library continues to be our top performing keyword search on Google. This ad group generated **261 Clicks in August**, with a CTR of **33%**.
- There were 18 calls to branches generated from our Google Ads, which is an increase of -63% from the previous month.

• We had 7 users click on the Google ad group to volunteer at the Library District, which is a decrease of -56% month-over-month.

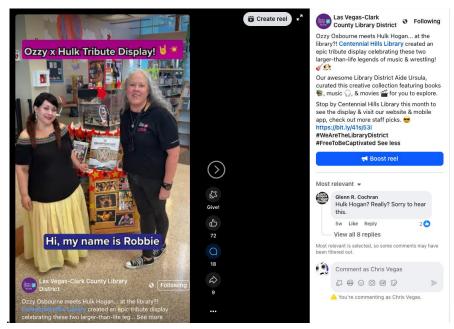




Top Social Media Posts August 2025

Facebook:

Our top post was a fun video BAM made with **Centennial Hills Library Branch Manager Robbie DeBuff** and **Library Aide II Ursula Underwood** to promote their creative display that celebrated the lives of Ozzy Osbourne and Hulk Hogan. This post generated **4,150 organic views, 235 user engagements,** including **26 comments,** & **9 shares.**



Instagram:

Our top post was a video BAM made to help promote the monthly themed yoga classes at Windmill Library. This post generated **5,047 organic views**, **412 user engagements, including 8 comments**, **17 saves**, **and 137 Shares of the post, which helped extend the reach**. BAM's digital team will be working on a collaboration with Yoga For Life to help promote their ongoing classes across the Library District.



LinkedIn:

Our top post for August was sharing one of the ongoing posts which promote the Library District's current job openings. This post generated **2,548 organic impressions**, **304 total user engagements**, and **9 shares**.



TikTok:

Our highest-performing post during our initial month on TikTok was a video BAM created with Clark County Library Teen Services Head Megan Nykodym to promote the Best Buy Teen Tech Center services and resources. This generated 9,327 Views, 857 Likes, 286 Saves, and 456 Shares of the post. Strong evergreen concepts like this are especially important for growing our audience on TikTok, where the algorithm of content appearing in users' feeds isn't chronological.

- The Library District's steady Facebook audience growth continued, crossing 20K Total Followers, with a +12% increase year-over-year, and +26% from August 2023.
- Our Total Impressions normalized after July's heavier activity, which can be attributed to our Summer Challenge Ad campaign. We decreased by -49% from the previous month but were up +81% year-over-year, and +175% since August 2023. This shows BAM's continued Meta Ad campaigns on Facebook are generating more online visibility through targeted digital advertising. BAM will continue to look for additional opportunities to run targeted advertising campaigns on Facebook like we did for the mobile app and license plate, in addition to promoting the Library District's annual initiatives like Library Card Sign-Up Month and Library Lovers' Month.
- Our User Engagement showed long-term gains, despite a dip of -49% from July. We saw increases of +123% year-over-year, and +118% from August 2023. This pattern aligns with Facebook broader shift towards Al-recommended posts, which can create month-to-month volatility even as our annual trends rise.
- While August Impressions and User Engagements were lower than July's elevated period, our year-over-year analytics are trending upward. BAM's content mix of priority event promotion, short-form video content, and photo carousels keep Facebook an effective social media channel for connecting with residents and collaborating with community partners.
- Each month, BAM continues to create Facebook Events for select CE/LO programs to increase online awareness and attendance.
- Facebook remains the largest social media platform and an important/effective
 communications tool for the Library District. However, generating more organic user
 engagement has been a challenge. Our Facebook Event listings are driving more online
 awareness, but sharing more branch-submitted content and vertical format videos has not
 significantly increased our organic posting analytics. BAM will continue to look for more
 opportunities to run targeted ad campaigns and boost certain posts to help increase our
 content reach and drive more user engagement.

- The Library District's TikTok (@thelibrarydistrict) launched August 1. Early reach of our posts already extends beyond our Total Followers which is encouraging to see.
- On TikTok, retention, completions, replays, shares, and favorites drive the algorithm
 more than comments, mirroring a broader short-form trend where users share/save more
 posts and like/comment less.
- Our initial content goal is 2–3 posts per week and 8–12 posts per month to build consistency, learn TikTok's algorithm, and keep the "For You" signal fresh so our content appears more to local users.
- BAM will use TikTok cuts for YouTube Shorts and Instagram Reels to help crosspromote our content on those platforms, while making some native edits on TikTok to connect with that specific audience.
- Audience growth on TikTok will steadily increase with consistent posting and iterative learning. Our early insights show we can reach local non-followers quickly. BAM will focus on sharing video content that will drive user **retention + shares** to convert that reach into sustained growth.

Insights:

- In August, our Instagram account continued to expand, with Followers up +3% monthover-month, +39% year-over-year, and +85% from August 2023. This shows steady growth to bring in new, local audiences, who are finding our content from targeted advertising and organically.
- User Engagement decreased -35% month-over-month but remained up +1% year-over-year. Our Total Shares dropped -37%, but increased +139% year-over-year, and +171% from August 2023, aligning with an industry trend where users share and save posts or DM them more often than they Like or comment publicly. Correspondingly, our Total Likes and Comments declined, which is consistent with this shift toward private/intentioned engagement. We anticipate this trend will continue and it will be important that we create the kind of content that drives user shares.
- Reels Video Views were down -36% month-over-month, -66% year-over-year, but up +22% from August 2023. As Instagram continues to prioritize short-form vertical videos amidst increasing creator volume, individual Reel view counts will fluctuate. BAM will keep optimizing hook-first openings, tighter video runtimes, engaging captions, and pursuing timely topics. We will pair Reels with photo carousel recaps from Signature and Featured branch events to capture more user saves and shares, which are user behaviors that Instagram's algorithm currently rewards.
- Each week, BAM actively uses the IG Stories feature to highlight priority programs, promote events, and feature user-generated content that tags the Library District.
- BAM continues to provide ongoing branch staff training focused on organic photos and short vertical clips, which consistently outperform static flyer graphics. This approach supports the platform's emphasis on original, authentic content and helps sustain our long-term growth.

Insights:

Our Total Followers increased +3% month-over-month, reflecting steady audience
growth as BAM continues to share career opportunities, community partnerships, and
organizational news, which is content categories that LinkedIn's audience and feed ranking
consistently favor.

- Total Impressions were down -31% month-over-month, but we up +11% year-over-year and +210% from August 2023. This aligns with current platform trends where post distribution can fluctuate month-to-month based on content mix, seasonality, and LinkedIn's push toward "knowledge" posts and employment opportunities.
- User Engagement decreased -25% month-over-month, but is +22% year-over-year, and +113% from August 2023. Our Post Shares increased +80% month-over-month, but this will fluctuate based on our monthly content. LinkedIn users increasingly engage via reactions, comments, saves, and DMs rather than public resharing.
- Traffic to priority landing pages on our website remained strong. Link Clicks were down -10% from July, but +69% year-over-year, and +354% from August 2023. Including consistent, clear calls-to-action in our posts about jobs, partnerships, and programs continues to drive qualified website visits from LinkedIn's professional audience.
- Video Views were down -32% month-over-month, -76% year-over-year, but up +100%
 From August 2023. Industry-wide, native video on LinkedIn tends to be outperformed by short knowledge sharing text posts and document/carousel posts for reach, while short-form vertical clips are consumed more on other platforms.
- As LinkedIn is primarily used for employment and career networking, our monthly analytics
 on this platform will fluctuate based on the monthly content shared. However, the updates
 we share on this platform connect with more targeted audiences: community partners,
 library industry professionals, Library District employees, and job seekers.

- The Library District's *Virtually Anywhere* YouTube Channel continues to grow, with 2,140 subscribers, a +1% increase month-over-month, +27% year-over-year, and +43% from August 2023. This shows a steady audience expansion on this platform and interest in our video content.
- Average View Duration increased +21% month-over-month, +32% year-over-year, and +34% compared to 2023. This shows that our short-form vertical video content is keeping viewers watching longer, which is an important metric as YouTube's algorithm increasingly prioritizes this content.
- Total Impressions decreased -7% from July and -37% year-over-year, but up +23% from August 2023. Platforms like YouTube now prioritize short, vertical videos and

personalize recommendations for each viewer. As a result, our long-form videos may see fewer views, while YouTube Shorts are more likely to reach our audience and surface to local viewers, including those who may not yet know the Library District is on YouTube, based on their interests and watch history.

- Total Channel Watch Time was down -43% month-over-month, and -14% year-over-year, but up +50% from August 2023. This pattern is consistent with the broader industry pivot to short-form video consumption. We anticipate that our Total Channel Watch Time will trend downward with more short-form video content being created, but our Average View Duration and User Engagement will increase.
- With YouTube continuing to emphasize Shorts and multi-format publishing, the Library District can maximize reach and depth by pairing our short-form vertical videos clips (for discovery and social media cross-platform posting) with select horizontal cuts (for branch monitor shows, YouTube playlists, and evergreen viewing).
- Each month, BAM adds Library District promotional videos and YouTube Shorts such as the #WeAreTheLibraryDistrict staff spotlight videos and branch-submitted vertical format video content. Uploading videos consistently is prioritized by YouTube's algorithm.

- Each month BAM spotlights the availability of the Library District mobile app on the website
 with priority placement on the homepage and audience browse pages. There are ongoing
 mentions in Library Highlights and on social media.
- In August, Apple device downloads were up +34% from the previous month. Android downloads increased by +70%. Our Total Impressions on Apple were up +126%, and +39% on Google Play. This is due to BAM running advertising campaigns in print publications and targeted digital campaigns on Facebook to increase awareness for the Library District's mobile app.
- Since the public launch in October 2024, the Library District's mobile app has been downloaded by 14,400 users on Apple devices and 4,170 users on Android devices.

- Website engagement remained steady, with 165,000 Unique Users in August, which
 was the same month-over-month, -7% compared to August 2024, and +8% from
 August 2023. This reflects consistent monthly traffic to the Library District website.
- Homepage views totaled 135,153, which was still robust, but down -1% from July and -9% year-over-year, but up +17% from August 2023. This indicates that while fewer visits began on the homepage compared to last year, the two-year trend remains positive.
- Engaged Sessions reached 377,132, up +7% month-over-month, flat vs. August 2024, and +43% from August 2023, signaling sustained, long-term growth in meaningful website interactions.
- Engaged Sessions Per User rose to 1.69, a +6% increase from July, +8% year-over-year, and +21% increase from August 2023, showing users are exploring more content on the website per visit than in prior time periods.
- Average Engagement Time across the website increased +4% month-over-month and +16% year-over-year but was down -17% from August 2023. The upward trends month-over-month and year-over-year suggest users are spending more time with our content than last year.
- These trends highlight a positive trajectory: depth of engagement continues to strengthen (higher Engaged Sessions and Sessions Per User), even as homepage starts softened versus 2024.
- The Library District's website continues to show long-term momentum, with users engaging more per visit and meaningful interactions growing since 2023.

This report provides an overview of District-wide Community Engagement division initiatives including adult literacy services, art gallery services, outreach services, project management, programming and venues services, adult services administration, and youth services administration. This report covers a one-month period of staff activity from **August 1, 2025 – August 31, 2025**.

POWERFUL PEOPLE

- Met with local yoga instructor Shardá Walker to explore teaching opportunities.
- Met with animal telepathist Erin Emre to explore potential pet programs.
- Collaborated with Dr. EJ January to present an educational motherhood program on October 3, 2025, at West Las Vegas Library.
- Discussed the screening and engagement program, *Are You a Librarian?* with Rodney Freeman to conduct the program during Black History Month.
- Supported Whitney Library's Writers Workshop featuring author Bonnie Kelso.
- Met with Mark Mabaquiao to develop educational Medicaid programs at Sunrise Library. The programs will focus on adults and seniors to improve awareness of available services.
- Hosted public receptions celebrating new art exhibits by Sarah Robles, Nevada Watercolor Society members, and the artists of Scrambled Eggs at Sahara West Library.
- Met with artists Chase McCurdy, Linda Harris, Steve Dudrow, and Lani Suarez to discuss upcoming exhibits.
- Hung updated Board of Trustees photo panels in the Las Vegas metropolitan library branches.
- Provided onboarding and library branch tours for Literacy Services Manager Kelee Dupuis.
- Met with FBI Community Outreach Specialist Bailee Schauer to discuss partnership and programming with the Library District.
- Met with LSTA Coordinator Alyssa Ericksen to discuss the My First Library program. Received \$50,000 from Nevada State Library and Archives to continue the program.
- Collaborated with Steve Fleming and the Goodsprings Historical Society to build a Storywalk for their program *Fallout Fest* in November.
- Connected with Cheryl Martinez of Heart of America to explore possible collaborations in beautifying library spaces.
- Strategized with Brian Garth of City of Las Vegas to build a Library Corner at the Las Vegas Book Festival.

- Engaged with Allison Hall and the KNPR team on the importance of supporting senior community members through caregiving and library resources.
- Collaborated with Damon Hodge and LaTasha Thomas of Springs Preserve to prepare for 2026 events.
- Hosted comedian Megan Dolan's one-woman show about being the mother of a child with autism.
- Staff at West Charleston, Summerlin, East Las Vegas, and Clark County libraries completed plans for Fall signature events.
- Technician Specialists Paul Flores and Diane Walton were promoted to full-time positions.
- Implemented a career skills ladder for Technician Specialists.

POWERFUL PLACES

- Began program planning for Maker March and April STEAM Month. The theme will focus on America 250, Nevadan governmental entities, and significant American scientific contributors. Staff met with program chairs to plan District-Wide programming and coordinated with the Las Vegas Science and Technology Festival.
- East Las Vegas hosted the 10th annual *Kickoff to Kindergarten* which helps connect families to neighborhood resources.

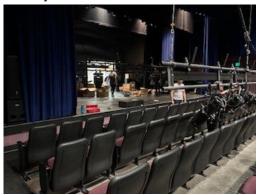

This memorandum reports on the Information Technology (IT) Department's activities and project updates for the month of September.

POWERFUL PEOPLE

Deloitte Audit & E-Rate Compliance

- **Status:** Virtual inspection held at 7 of our branches completed on September 8. Final inquiry discussion held on September 22.
- Impact: Ensures compliance, protects funding, and strengthens financial controls.
- Next: Awaiting Deloitte's final decision, expected in November or December 2025.

Microsoft 365 Migration – Managed Service Provider (MSP) Scoping

- Status: Engaged three Microsoft Gold MSPs—NetEffect LLC, Integrated Axis, and Sentinel—for no-cost assessments and Statements of Work (SOWs). NetEffect's scoping is complete; currently working with Sentinel.
- **Impact:** Provides independent options, timelines, and cost clarity for the District's Microsoft 365 cloud migration plan.
- Next: Review proposals and present recommendation to the Administrative Team.

Sierra Integrated Library System (ILS)

- Status: Upgrade is underway. Final cutover/completion scheduled for October 13.
- **Impact:** Ensures continued system stability, introduces enhancements, and improves the patron experience.

This report summarizes the activity of the Collections and Bibliographic Services Departments, including CBS, Electronic Resources, the Distribution Center and Interlibrary Loan for the period of September 1-30, 2025.

Collection Development Librarian Dan Wiig spent the \$40,000 LSTA digital enrichment grant to purchase business ebooks and e-audio. Many of the titles focus on personal finance, entrepreneurship, business plans and startups. The material was selected specifically for the new West Las Vegas Enterpreneur project.

Youth Services Collection Developmenbt Librarian Doris Cazares recorded two video tutorials for Youth Services Staff on how to navigate the Bibz and Midwest Tape vendor websites. The tutorials teach staff how to request titles from monthly lists and carts that are shared by Collection Development. Both video tutorials will be available for staff to watch on demand via Niche academy. Doris also created a quick how to guide and handout for both Bibz and Midwest Tape.

YPL Collection Development Manager Jen Jost attended the Youth Services Department Head Meeting on 9/9; Youth Cultural Programming Committee Meeting, 9/10; and visited the Distribution Center for weeding on 9/26.

On 9/18, Doris Cazares and Eric Howes joined Raychel Lendis for a reverse inventory project at the Goodsprings Library. Similar reverse inventory projects are planned for later in the year.

CBS Director Rebecca Colbert coordinated and received a donation of 3,000 STEAM gifts bags filled with classroom supplies to give to patrons. The donation came from a partnership with the Boys and Girls Club of Southern Nevada who, in turn, originally received the materials from GM Cares, a corporate volunteer part of General Motors Corporation. They will be distributed to branches for release in October.

Collection By the Numbers August 2025

The District's total circulation for August was 1,008,566 of which 49% was derived from the use of e-media (i.e. e-books, e-audiobooks, streaming video, and digital magazines). Physical library material circulation was 513,234 and e-media circulation was 495,332. A breakdown of the e-media circulation by format follows:

- E-Books 184,136
- E-Audiobooks 216,576
- Magazines 37,115
- Music 37,44139,321
- Video 18,184

Boulder City and North Las Vegas customers have access to the District's Overdrive e-media collection, and the North Las Vegas Library District's customers accounted for approximately 6.5% of our Overdrive circulation while the Boulder City Library District's customers accounted for approximately 1.6%. Henderson Libraries accounted for 1% of Overdrive checkouts with 3,728 checkouts while LVCCLD accounted for 760 checkouts of Henderson's Overdrive content. Instant Digital cards generated 4.6% of Overdrive circulation with 18,126 checkouts. 980 new IDC users were created; 977 were local residents and three were visitors.

CBS staff added 1,820 titles with 14,184 new items to the District's collection, while 6,066 items were withdrawn from the library catalog in August. Collection Development staff added 58,502 e-books and e-audiobooks to the collection in August.

The Library at the Boulevard Mall had 21 items circulate in August and 14 items returned. The Sunrise Hospital Anytime Library also had six items checked out in the same period.

Cataloging added 14,184 new items to our collection. There were 7210 music titles added in 47 languages including 3420 English song titles and 260 Spanish albums for August.

Cataloging removed 826 Hoopla records from Sierra, updated 205 OCLC holding records. There were 3192 ISBN updates sent to EBSCO for Novelist Select Catalog Enhancement Program for August.

There were zero bibliographic records downloaded for Boulder City and North Las Vegas in August.

Distribution Center

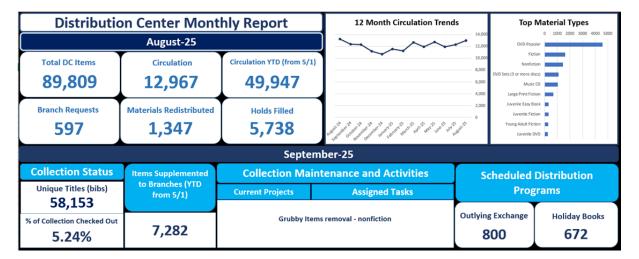
Statistics for August 2025

The Distribution Center collection currently consists of **89,809** items and **58,153** unique titles. The DC circulated **12,967** items in **August** and **5,738** items from the collection went to fill customer holds requests. Branches requested **597** items to add to their collections, and the DC redistributed an additional **1,347** popular items to where they are more likely to circulate. The DC also exchanged more than **800** items to the Greater Clark County libraries to aid in maintaining a responsive collection, and redistributed **672** Halloween books for the upcoming holiday.

Electronic Resources Librarian Erin Collins attended the Your Cultural Programming Committee meeting on August 27th & September 10th. She reviewed two programs for the committee. She provided a demo of the online resource TeachingBooks. She also shared with committee members how they can use this resource to locate professional reviews & award lists when evaluating titles for programs.

On September 4th, Electronic Resources Manager Suzanne Fayle attended the District Department Head Meeting.

On September 9th, Electronic Resources Manager Suzanne Fayle attended the Youth Services Department Head Meeting where she briefly spoke to staff about the virtual scavenger hunt activity for Winter Challenge.

On September 9th, Electronic Resources Librarian Erin Collins attended the Teen Team meeting & demonstrated the TeenTober Virtual Escape Room activity. On September 10th, Electronic Resources Librarian Stephanie LeClaire-Vazquez

attended the New Leader Onboarding for Business Strategies & Planning.

Customer & Staff Assistance

The Electronic Resources Department assists customers with applying for eCards, using library resources & apps, as well as answers reference questions. In August, the department answered 741 emails that came to the Ask account. The department answered 157 phone calls that came through the Ask phone line totaling 16 hours & 51 minutes.

Electronic Resource Training & Promotion

During the month of August, public Niche Academy tutorials had a total of 386 views. The most popular tutorials were Overdrive/Libby eBooks, Audiobooks, & Magazines (50 views) hoopla eBooks, Audiobooks, Movies, TV, & Music (44 views), & Gale Courses: Free Online Courses (42 views).

During the month of August, staff Niche Academy Electronic Resources training videos saw a total of 1,442 views. The most popular tutorials being Digital Toolbox: Online Resources for Youth Services Staff (706 views), Libby Extras (214 views), & Stress-Free Searching: Finding Books by Reading Level (20 views).

On August 20th, Electronic Resources Librarian Stephanie LeClaire-Vazquez facilitated Libby Extras training. The training had 20 staff members in attendance. The training went over details on how to access Libby Extras & content of the service. A recording of the training has been uploaded to Niche Academy for on demand viewing.

In August, Erin Collins posted a recorded tutorial version of Digital Toolbox: Online Resources for Youth Services training in Niche Academy. On September 2nd, Erin Collins viewed the webinar Introducing the New NoveList K-8 Experience. The vendor NoveList went over enhancements made to the online resource.

On September 11th, Erin Collins viewed a Niche Academy hosted webinar The Total Package: Supporting and Engaging the Learner, Before, During and After Class.

Fresh Picks

In August, 10,049 Fresh Picks eNewsletters were sent to customers. The most popular eNewsletters were New York Times Fiction Best Sellers (57% opened), Top Ten (55% opened) & Staff Picks (54% opened). August saw 38 new Fresh Picks subscribers. The Library District has 1,182 unique subscribers who have subscribed to a total of 6,289 monthly subscriptions.

Device Management Support

The Electronic Resources Department supports the circulation & maintenance of iPads throughout the district. The department repairs iPads, replenishes supplies, & ensures the iPad kiosks are in working order. In August, the department responded to 17 iPad work orders & the total iPad circulation was 411.

In August, Electronic Resources Librarian Stephanie LeClaire-Vazquez coordinated the delivery of the ER Laptop Cart to five branches to support seven branch programs & computer center classes.

Monthly Electronic Resources Statistics

In August 2025, the total eMedia circulation was 495,332 & we had 427,532 retrievals usage for Online Resources.

Interlibrary Loan (ILL):

- During the month of August, there were 43 new ILL users.
- ILL received <u>370</u> LVCCLD customer requests to obtain materials from other libraries. ILL staff filled 88.6% of our customer's requests this month, and 89.9% of requests received were picked up by customers.
- LVCCLD received <u>549</u> requests to lend our items to other agencies this month. Additionally, this month's average turnaround time (time between when we receive a request, obtain the item, and prepare it to be shipped) was 2 day, 01 hours, and 26 minutes, <u>2:01:26</u>.
- In August, there were 16 staff members that viewed information in Learn About Interlibrary Loan (ILL) section of Niche Academy.
- In August, Interlibrary Loan provided staff training for 7 staff members.

SUBJECT: Financial Services Report, October 2025

Enclosed are the budget status reports for September 2025. General fund revenues show 23% of budgeted revenues collected.

Property Tax Revenues

As of September 15, 2025, the District collected \$22.6 million in property taxes, a 10% increase from the same period in the prior year.

Consolidated Sales Tax Revenues (CTX)

The CTX shows 7% collected so far this fiscal year. The most recent CTX received by the District on September 12, 2025, represents CTX from the month of July 2025, which is the first CTX collection for FY 2026. The \$2.1M collected is \$350K, or 14%, lower than the amount collected for the same period last fiscal year.

Sales tax is volatile from month to month. Staff will continue to track whether this pattern continues over multiple months.

Expenditures

The General Fund spent 16% of the allocated budget for FY 2026, which is consistent with prior years for this time period. See the summary of expenditures by department in the reports below.

Goodsprings Library Relocation



On September 17th the District appeared before the Clark County Zoning Commission. The District was on the agenda to request approval of a zoning change from residential to public as well as waivers for Public Works request for certain off-site improvements. The off-site improvement included sidewalks and a street light which the Citizens advisory Board had request the District not include in our project.

Our agenda items were unanimously passed.

We are commencing phase 2 at this time, which is requesting a change of use from residential to a library from the Building Department as well as starting the permitting process.

West Charleston Library Refresh -

The Design phase of the West Charleston Library Refresh is under way.

The refresh is required to help the branch meet programing needs. The branch refresh will include all new carpet, a new Computer Lab, a new Creations Lab, new patron seating, expanded staff offices and a new SPS office and dressing room.

The BLM has confirmed our application is complete. We are currently awaiting a lease for the property for review. We are also working with Commissioner Tick Segerblom's office who have planning meetings directly with the BLM.

Safety and Security Update:

General Services supported Programming and Venue Services in providing additional Security Guards for special events in September.

The Safety Manager continues to work with the SNHD to provide Opioid Awareness training to any staff member who is interested in attending. At this time, there are approximately 260 District employees who have taken this training! A supply of Narcan

was placed in each of the District's AED cabinets back in April. Since that time, we have had four medical emergencies where either staff or security have administered Narcan, and each time a life was saved.

On September 25th, 2025, six of our locations participated in <u>Save a Life Day</u>. This event was in partnership with the Southern Nevada Health District. They shared that, "This important event is focused on expanding **low-barrier access to naloxone** for the general public in an effort to prevent opioid overdose deaths and is in partnership with SOAR of West Virginia (learn more about the national initiative here: https://soarwv.org/save-a-life-day-2025/)" Each of the participating branches set up a table with boxes of naloxone, brochures and information for customers to freely take throughout the day.

The Safety Manager continues to conduct CPR/AED and MOAB classes for all PICs and any interested District staff members.
